Dear Representatives Reschenthaler and Dean,

I am writing on behalf of the members of the Fraternal Order of Police to advise you of our support for your bill, H.R. 2368, the "Supporting and Treating Officers in Crisis (STOIC) Act."

Law enforcement officers put themselves in harm's way on a daily basis as they go about their sworn duty to serve and protect our communities. We do a very good job at protecting our officers' physical safety by providing them with tools like anti-ballistic body armor. Thousands of officers have been saved by this equipment. However, it is a sad fact that we lose more officers to suicide every year than die in the line of duty. We must do more to help the officers suffering from job-related stress and address the need for better mental resiliency and wellness for our officers and their families.

The legislation you have introduced will revive and expand programs designed to help officers and their families with stress reduction, suicide prevention, and the promotion of overall mental health and wellness. We believe that these programs have the potential to save just as many lives as soft body armor.

Under current law and the bill as introduced, these programs would be administered by the Bureau of Justice Assistance in the U.S. Department of Justice. Given the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS) administers the Law Enforcement Mental Health and Wellness Act and has such expertise in mental health and wellness issues for law enforcement, we would recommend that the programs established by H.R. 2368 be transferred to the COPS Office. We would be happy to work with you and your staff on such an effort.


